Building Democracy

Iraqi Police reform is one of the most important parts of making Iraq a free and democratic society. In Tikrit and the Salah Al-Dein province, 720th MP Battalion soldiers are leading this reform process.

Battalion soldiers are teaching Iraqi policemen principles and techniques of democratic law enforcement in classroom lectures and activities, as well as during joint planning and execution of missions. They have spent long days in hot, crowded rooms interviewing and screening every potential Iraqi policeman. They have helped distribute new uniforms and equipment to the Iraqi police force, and contributed to repairs and up grades to their police stations.

The Iraqi police in Tikrit are now taking more initiative as law enforcers for their country, city and people. They are leading raids, apprehending criminals and confiscating weapons. Citizens of Tikrit are beginning to trust their police force with information about suspected Saddam Hussein loyalists and the location of hidden weapons.

The result has been a decrease in criminal and terrorist activity against Iraqi civilians and coalition forces in Tikrit and the Salah Al-Dein province.

The 64th MP Company is now providing support to the 4th Infantry Division in three locations; Samarra East Airfield, Balad and Samarra. Their missions include providing convoy escorts, EPW security, combat patrols and joint Iraqi police/MP patrols.

Though everyone is looking forward to our return home, it is exciting to be part of building a democracy for people who for decades have only known oppression.

"Our Soldiers"

About one month ago, a retired MP Colonel sent me a document describing the "average American soldier." I do not know who the author was, but the descriptions of the soldiers reminded me of our mighty "Soldiers of the Gauntlet" and I'd like to share it with you. It read something like this:


The average age of the military soldier is 19 years. Normally short haired, tight-muscled kids who, under normal circumstances are considered by society as half child, half adult. Not yet dry behind the ears, not old enough to buy a beer, but old enough to die for their country. They never really cared much for work and they would rather wax their own car than then wash their father's; but they have never collected unemployment either. They are a recent High School graduate; and were probably an average student, pursued some form of sport activities, drive a ten year old jalopy, and have a steady girlfriend/boyfriend that either broke up with them when they left, or swears to be waiting when they return from half a world away. They listen to rock and roll or hip-hop or rap or jazz or swing and 155mm Howitzers. They are 10 or 15 pounds lighter now than when they were at home because they are working or fighting from before dawn to well after dusk. They have trouble spelling, thus letter writing is a pain for him, but they can field strip a rifle in 30 seconds and reassemble it in less time in the dark. They can recite to you the nomenclature of a machine gun or grenade launcher and use either one effectively if they must. They can dig foxholes and latrines and can apply first aid like professionals. They can march until told to stop or stop until they are told to march. They obey orders instantly and without hesitation, but they are not without spirit or individual dignity. **(see Commander on page 6)**

Iraq Police Reform

The Iraqi police force in Tikrit, Iraq, led by soldiers of the 720th Military Police Battalion, is currently undergoing a reform process that is designed to make it capable of enforcing law and order for the city's people.

Under the Saddam Hussein regime, the army or various security forces such as the Fedayeen Saddam provided iron fisted security in the country, leaving the police little or no role to play as law enforcers.

That has changed under the U.S. led Coalition Provisional Authority, and now the police have become a key part of securing peace and stability in Iraq.

"Probably the most important thing we are doing right now is building up the police into a legitimate force so that they can provide security for their own people," said Cpt. Christopher Kasker, assistant operations officer, 720th MP Battalion, who is in charge of coordinating the battalion's police reform missions in Tikrit and the surrounding province.

The reform process in Tikrit includes rebuilding and refurbishing the main police station, as well as giving the police new uniforms to wear and new equipment to use. It also includes joint patrols and raids in which Iraqi police and 720th MP Battalion soldiers have worked side by side, a valuable on-the-job training experience for the police officers.

But at the core of the process is the Transition and Integration Program, a three-week course designed by the CPA that all Iraqi police officers are required to attend.

"The goal of the course is to open up the minds of the Iraqi police to new philosophies of policing," said Sgt. 1st Class Michael Robledo, battalion operations sergeant, 720th MP Battalion, who is the lead instructor for the course in Tikrit.

"We teach them how to work as police officers in a democratic society, and give them new standards to live and work by as police officers," he said.

The course includes classes on human rights, international law and prohibitions against torture, as well as on firearms safety, interview techniques and patrol procedures. Classes are taught by an English speaking instructor and an Arabic speaking translator.

The police students participate through discussions, small group exercises and hands on training. At the end of the three week course, they have gained knowledge and skills that will make them better police officers, said Robledo.

"There is still a long way for them to go," he said. "But I think this is the first step in the right direction to improve the police force in Iraq."

Finally, 1st Platoon "Rottweilers" hold steadfast and ready as our general support platoon ready to jump at any division tasking that comes our way.

I have to tell you that although our platoons have been very busy, our Grizzly Motorpool has been a hot bed of activity this past month. Our mechanics have been very occupied with maintaining our fleet of vehicles. They serviced over 38 pieces of equipment in a period of about 15 days! We are in the process of standing up certified police academies to ensure that adequate standards, professionalism, and esprit de corps are firmly implemented throughout Iraqi police officer ranks.

A stipend or allowance is currently being paid to the former soldiers as monetary compensation or temporary solution in lieu of a pension for the now defunct Iraqi Army. There is a certain criminal element that exists in Iraq who would like to disrupt these sites, as they are one of the many stepping-stones in the peace process between the Iraqi people and the Americans. Our military police soldiers provide the necessary protection for these pay sites to ensure that the lawful distribution of money goes to its just recipients.

As before, there is still no definitive word on when we will redeploy, yet. As soon as we know, we will let all of you know. Many of you have heard that the Department of Defense has proposed a two-week block leave period for soldiers deployed to Iraq. If approved by the Secretary Of Defense, this will undoubtedly be a very sought after and much needed break for these soldiers. They have done all they have been asked to do and then some. You all will be duly notified on the status and the details of this block leave as soon as it comes to fruition. If you're thirsty, they'll share their water with you; if you are hungry, their food. They'll even split their ammunition with you in the midst of battle when you run low. They have learned to use their hands like weapons and weapons like they were their hands. They can save your life - or take it, because that is their job. They will often do twice the work of a civilian, draw half the pay and still find ironic humor in it all. They have seen more suffering and death than they should have in their short lifetime. They have wept in public and in private, for friends who have fallen in combat and are unashamed.







Iraq Police Reform





The Transition and Integration program is a three week course that teaches Iraqi police officers the fundamentals of democratic police work. It includes lectures, small group activities and discussions, and hands on training. Upon completion of the course, police officers are presented an official diploma during a graduation ceremony.

The last step in the Iraq Police reform process is joint operations. Throughout August, 720th MP Battalion soldiers and Iraqi police have planned and executed joint raids and patrols. The Iraqi Police have gradually taken a larger leadership role in the operations, with MPs participating in a support and observation role.

Because of their work with the 720th MP Battalion, the Iraqi Police are now better equipped and trained. The result has been a decrease in criminal and terrorist activity against civilians and coalition forces in and around Tikrit.


